Society (TBS)
will celebrate
it's second
anniversary this
fall. It has been
a very good
experience for
me.The TBS is
divided into
three regions:

East, Central and West, with three board members from each region. We have very capable board members from all across the state. They are very dedicated and resourceful, full of vision and energy. I am proud to be president of the TBS.

As I write this message we have 98 members. About a third are members of each of the two chartered bird clubs; The Tellico Village Bird Club Chapter and the Jackson Chapter of the Tennessee Bluebird Society. The rest, about a third, are individual members from across the state.

Our mission, as stated in our by-laws, is to support the recovery and perpetuation of the Eastern Bluebird and other cavity nesting birds native to the Tennessee. From all indications our members are heavy into this mission and very capable of conducting educational programs, workshops and gathering data for research, which is also part of our mission.

Projects needing our attention are Membership, Education and Research.

Membership. This area is most important. I challenge each of us to sign up five (5) new members before the year closes December 31, 2015. I would like our Board members and Chapter presidents to consider organizing a Chapter with 15 to 25 members. Look on the TBS web site (tnbluebirdsociety.org) and find the Membership Application. Add two lines at bottom of form (if not on it), one for your name as sponsor and another for identifying Chapter membership. It is recommended you also add, if appropriate, the cost of Chapter membership on the form (usually \$10 per year and this money remains in the Chapter). Along this line let's try for membership of a qualified individual in each of Tennessee's 95 counties.

Education. We have, prepared by Chuck James and Stan Colburn, a presentation adaptable to small and large groups. It's available on USB Flash Drive (memory stick). Several of our members have been conducting education and informational talks for clubs and organizations. Please report these meetings (date, time, group presented to, as well as the presenter(s). Send this info to TBS at the address below.

Research. I urge all of us to submit data on numbers of Nest Boxes, Trails (1 or more nest boxes), nesting attempts, average number of eggs, total of fledglings and average nesting attempts. Please comment on the ways you are protecting the nest boxes. It would be great if those of you in Charter Clubs would total this info for your Chapter and individual members total yours and email to tnsialia@gmail.com. Please email us for the appropriate form. Your data will be very helpful and shared with TBS, NABS and the Cornell Lab of Ornithology.

Statement reads "Encourage and aid in the development of nest box trails and collecting data for research".

This past February Stan
Colburn and I were giving a
presentation on basic
Bluebirding at our local "Wild
Birds Unlimited" after our
presentation Billie Cantwell, a

member of the Knoxville Chapter Tennessee Ornithological Society came to us and explained that our new state birding park, may need some help with their nest box trail. Both Stan and I looked at each other and said yes, we need to see if there is an opportunity for the Tennessee Bluebird Society to help.

The state took over the former Seven Islands Wildlife Refuge about a year ago from Knox County Parks and Recreation Department. The park encompasses 416 acres along the French Broad River in Knox County, approximately 19 miles East of Knoxville. This is a premier birding destination with over 180 species of birds sighted. Within a couple of weeks of our chance meeting with Billie, we met with Justine Cucchiara, Seven Islands State Birding Manager. Justine explained to us that the park had 54 nest boxes, some needed to be repaired and they did not have a formal monitoring protocol or volunteers

We decided that the first order of business was to assess the nest boxes. After looking at all 54 nest boxes on two different 1 1/2 mile trails we realized that most could not be saved, however, a few were occupied.

Not knowing how we were going to get the funding and find the willing hands to build 50 nest boxes we decided to first organize a team of volunteers to train to monitor the nest boxes. Through working with the park and Friends President Morton Massey we were able to setup and train two teams to monitor the nest boxes weekly and record the data for future research, both local and at Cornell Ornithological Lab in Ithaca, NY.

SEVEN ISLANDS STATE BIRDING PARK CONTINUED

Our next task was to find help to build nest boxes. Both Stan Colburn and Mort Massey agreed to build some of the nest boxes but we needed additional help. Stan contacted the Tellico Village Woodworkers and asked for their help. They presented the idea to their club and agreed that it would be a good community project. They got to work and built 25 nest boxes. Through the efforts of Stan, Mort and the Tellico Village Woodworkers it saved the park about \$1,200 in costs.

One week after competition we were checking a few of the new nest boxes and a bluebird was already building



a nest.

Although this was a big project we are so pleased that Tennessee's first birding park would select the Tennessee Bluebird Society to manage this project.

Overall, our native cavity nesting birds make up a small part of the bird population in the park, but we believe an important part.



Thanks to funding from the Friends of Seven Islands State Birding Park and the park we were able to cover all the costs of the nest boxes, poles and hardware necessary to install all 50 nest boxes.

Once all the pieces were put in place it was time to start constructing two new trails and taking down the old nest boxes. We thought this project would take through September to complete. Stan, Mort, Nick and I started putting up the first nest box trail of 25 nest boxes. The first day after cutting conduit and rebar we were able to install 20 nest boxes.

Special thanks to Nick Mann, a Summer Intern from University of Tennessee who took the project on and completed installing all the remaining nest boxes on the two trails of 25 nest boxes each.

There are 57 State Parks in Tennessee. We need to make sure we continue this cooperative partnership in conservation with our state parks.

Q:A friend told me he cleans out his nest box after each fledging. I usually wait 'til the end of the nesting season. I always thought removing the nest would discourage the bluebirds from returning. What do you think?

A: I clean out mine after each fledging also. Here's why. If the used nest harbors any parasites, they will infest the next brood. Used nests can get quite messy sometimes, depending on the chicks diet. It also helps me keep track of whether the nest I see, is indeed a new nest, and not abandoned. It also keeps the nest from being too close to the opening, which makes the contents less vulnerable to predators. If the birds are successful at a particular nest box location, they will return to that box, even if the old nest is gone.

Q: I see the bluebirds come to my box and look in, but they won't go in and build a nest. Why?

A: Take a good close look inside the top of the box. Paper wasps will build nests in the tops of nest boxes. Bluebirds will not risk getting stung. If



there is a paper wasp nest, remove it in the early morning hours when it's still cool outside. Wasp are much slower when it's cold. Use a spatula or puddy knife. Then coat the upper insides with a

bar of soap. The wasp will not be able to get it's

nest to stick to the wood. Be very careful, especially if you are allergic to wasps.




